Preparation for Worship

This is a time to prepare for the worship of our holy God. Pray that God would meet His people as we gather.

<u>Call to</u> Worship

It is the Lord who calls His people to worship Him in Spirit and in Truth. We do not call ourselves. Worship is a reflexive and deliberate response to His gracious call.

Invocation

This prayer exalts the name of the Lord and invokes His presence and communion as we come to worship Him. Restore us, O God of hosts; let your face shine, that we may be saved! You brought a vine out of Egypt; you drove out the nations and planted it. You cleared the ground for it; it took deep root and filled the land. 
Pastor: *Christ is risen!*

Corporate Confession of

<u>Sin</u> Having come into His presence, we are reminded that we are sinners in need of the deliverance from sin and its power. We both confess and lament sin as an act of worship and faith in the God Who promises to deliver His people from all their sin and sorrow. We encourage a posture of prayer (sitting or kneeling) that is most comfortable for you.

Hymn of Confession/ Lament This hymn focuses

on the acknowledgment of our sin, our need of forgiveness, and the only One in whom our forgiveness and restoration are found. Nothing is covered up that will not be revealed, or hidden that will not be known. Therefore whatever you have said in the dark shall be heard in the light, and what you have whispered in private rooms shall be proclaimed on the housetops.

Merciful God, forgive my sins. Forgive the sins that I remember, and the sins I have forgotten. Forgive my many failures in the face of temptation, and those times when I have been stubborn in the face of correction. Forgive the times that I have been proud of my own achievements, and when I have failed to boast in Your works. Forgive the harsh judgments I have made of others, and the leniency I have shown myself. Forgive the lies that I have told to others, and the truths I have avoided. Forgive the pain I have caused others and the indulgence I have shown myself. Jesus, have mercy on me and make me whole. Amen.

THE LITURGICAL ELEMENTS OF OUR WORSHIP

Why do we do what we do during our corporate worship service on Sunday? To a visitor it could seem strange. We do more than just sing, which is usually what people associate with the word "worship". There are times of silence. Prayers are spoken. The Bible is read. A sermon on a particular passage of Scripture is heard. We eat a bite of bread and drink a small amount of wine or juice in celebration of Christ's death. Money is collected. Hands are raised in devotion. Why are these elements a part of what we do together? Why don't we just hang out in small groups and sip coffee? Why don't we just sit back and watch an hour long video on being better people? All of these elements are a part of our worship because we believe they show honor to God in the way he wants to be honored. These aren't just made up elements. They are pieces in a story that is told each Sunday, with each piece either commanded or exemplified in scripture.

WHY OUR PASTORS WEAR ROBES

Wearing a robe **hides the man** - No matter what the pastor wears, whether it be an expensive suit, an inexpensive suit, business casual or holey jeans with his shirt untucked, people are always prone to put too much stock in whatever style he prefers. The black Geneva robe is designed to remove this distraction and allow us to focus on the One whom he represents. That leads to the second point. It also **emphasizes his office.** Just as a judge wears a robe when in the courtroom, a fireman wears a uniform when on duty, or a military officer wears his dress greens or blues to a formal event to announce that they are acting in an official capacity, our pastors wear robes during the worship service to signify that they are acting in their official capacity as men who have been called by God to proclaim His word to His people. The robe reminds the congregation (and the minister!) that he is in the pulpit as an ambassador of Christ, and thus is not to speak his own thoughts, give mere advice, or share worldly wisdom, but only the Word of God.

CHILDREN IN WORSHIP

We believe children are a blessing from the Lord, and that they should be included in the worship of God with the people of God. That means at times there will be noise in the worship service. **God put the wiggle in children and that wiggle is welcome in His house!** If you are not used to it, it may take a little time. We understand. Bearing with one another in love is our calling.

Our aim is to help parents in the training of their children in the "pew". We do this in two ways:

1. Sunday evening worship.

Every Sunday, we plan our worship services taking both children and parents into consideration. First, the Hymn of Preparation is chosen with our children in mind. We want it to be a song that they know or at least can learn quickly. Second, we offer childcare for those 0-3 during the sermon. But please know, we enjoy having children in worship! They are not distractions! Keeping them with us in worship is one of the best gifts we can give them as they will learn the blessing of worship and grow in ways we cannot imagine. Feel free to sit up front where it is easier for children to see and hear what is happening.

2. Weekly family worship.

To facilitate learning throughout the week, the following ideas are provided for families to use during their own times of worship. We incorporate the hymns, confession of faith and sermon passage for familiarity and repetition purposes.

Weekly Catechism: WSC Q&As 83-84

Q83: Are all transgressions of the law equally heinous?

A83: Some sins in themselves, and by reason of several aggravations, are more heinous in the sight of God than others.

Q84: What does every sin deserve?A84: Every sin deserves God's wrath and curse, both in this life, and that which is to come.

<u>Wednesday</u>

Sing Psalm 9. Read Hosea 8:7-11, 2 Kings 17:6-23, and WSC 83-84. Why did Israel's treaties increase their idolatry? How would the Lord use their allies to discipline them? When were Hosea's prophecies of judgment fulfilled? What warnings from the Lord should we respond to? Sing "Holy, Holy, Holy". Read Hosea 8:1-3, Matthew 7:15-23, and WSC 83-84. What does it mean to transgress God's covenant? Why did the people claim to know God? Why

was this a false claim? What is the point of Jesus's warning in Matthew 7? How do we know what we know Him?

<u>Thursday</u>

Sing "O For a Thousand Tongues..." Read Hosea 8:12-14, Luke 12:1-5, and WSC 83-84. Why would God's law not stop Israel's sinning? Why did the sacrifices not atone for their sins? What does Jesus's warning in Luke mean? How should this lead us to repentance?

<u>Tuesday</u>

Sing Psalm 50:1-6. Read Hosea 8:4-6, 1 Kings 12:20-33, and WSC 83-84. What sins does God decry in these verses? How are wicked rulers an act of God's judgment? How are we tempted seek security through political power? Why is this futile?

<u>Friday</u>

Sing "Take My Life…" Read Hosea 8, Hebrews 10:1-18, and WSC 83-84. What sacrifice perfectly atones? How can we be saved by that sacrifice? What does it mean that God will remember our sins no more? How does this make the new covenant better than the Mosaic covenant?
