"Amen!" Praise the Lord!



THE LITURGICAL ELEMENTS OF OUR WORSHIP

Why do we do what we do during our corporate worship service on Sunday? To a visitor it could seem strange. We do more than just sing, which is usually what people associate with the word "worship". There are times of silence. Prayers are spoken. The Bible is read. A sermon on a particular passage of Scripture is heard. We eat a bite of bread and drink a small amount of wine or juice in celebration of Christ's death. Money is collected. Hands are raised in devotion. Why are these elements a part of what we do together? Why don't we just hang out in small groups and sip coffee? Why don't we just sit back and watch an hour long video on being better people? All of these elements are a part of our worship because we believe they show honor to God in the way he wants to be honored. These aren't just made up elements. They are pieces in a story that is told each Sunday, with each piece either commanded or exemplified in scripture.

WHY OUR PASTORS WEAR ROBES

Wearing a robe **hides the man** - No matter what the pastor wears, whether it be an expensive suit, an inexpensive suit, business casual or holey jeans with his shirt untucked, people are always prone to put too much stock in whatever style he prefers. The black Geneva robe is designed to remove this distraction and allow us to focus on the One whom he represents. That leads to the second point. It also **emphasizes his office.** Just as a judge wears a robe when in the courtroom, a fireman wears a uniform when on duty, or a military officer wears his dress greens or blues to a formal event to announce that they are acting in an official capacity, our pastors wear robes during the worship service to signify that they are acting in their official capacity as men who have been called by God to proclaim His word to His people. The robe reminds the congregation (and the minister!) that he is in the pulpit as an ambassador of Christ, and thus is not to speak his own thoughts, give mere advice, or share worldly wisdom, but only the Word of God.

CHILDREN IN WORSHIP

We believe children are a blessing from the Lord, and that they should be included in the worship of God with the people of God. That means at times there will be noise in the worship service. **God put the wiggle in children and that wiggle is welcome in His house!** If you are not used to it, it may take a little time. We understand. Bearing with one another in love is our calling.

Our aim is to help parents in the training of their children in the "pew". We do this in two ways:

1. Sunday evening worship.

Every Sunday, we plan our worship services taking both children and parents into consideration. First, the Hymn of Preparation is chosen with our children in mind. We want it to be a song that they know or at least can learn quickly. Second, we offer childcare for those 0-3 during the sermon. But please know, we enjoy having children in worship! They are not distractions! Keeping them with us in worship is one of the best gifts we can give them as they will learn the blessing of worship and grow in ways we cannot imagine. Feel free to sit up front where it is easier for children to see and hear what is happening.

2. Weekly family worship.

To facilitate learning throughout the week, the following ideas are provided for families to use during their own times of worship. We incorporate the hymns, confession of faith and sermon passage for familiarity and repetition purposes.

Weekly Catechism: WSC Q&A 35

Q: What is sanctification?

A: Sanctification is the work of God's free grace, whereby we are renewed in the whole man after the image of God, and are enabled more and more to die unto sin, and live unto righteousness.

<u>Wednesday</u>

Sing "Before the Throne of God Above".

Read Romans 6:19-20, Colossians 3:5-10, and WSC 35.

Why does Paul say he is speaking in human terms? How does sin lead to more sin? How does this encourage us to resist temptation?

What command does Paul give in verse 19? What specific way can you do that today? What is the result of obedience? How are those enslaved to sin free concerning righteousness?

Monday

Sing Psalm 118:22-29.
Read Romans 6:15-16, 2 Peter 2:17-22, and WSC 35.
Why does Paul raise this next question? What does it mean to be a slave? How can we present ourselves as slaves to sin? To obedience? What is the end result of antinomianism? How is that worse than never hearing the gospel?

Thursday

Sing "Mediator".

Read Romans 6:21-22, Galatians 6:7-10, and WSC 35.

What fruit does sin bring? Why is it good to have shame for those things? What is the final fruit of sin?

What fruit do slaves of God get?

How does it lead to holiness? What is the final fruit of holiness? To whom can you do good today?

Tuesday

Sing Psalm 73.
Read Romans 6:17-19a, John 8:25-38, and WSC 35.
What is the form or standard of teaching? What does it mean that Christians are committed to it? How have you heard this teaching? How does Jesus say we can be set free from sin?

Friday

Sing "Take my Life and Let it Be".
Read Romans 6:15-23, Proverbs
10:16-17, and WSC 35.
What is a wage? How do our sins
earn death? Why is it important to
know that eternal life is a free gift?
That it is in Christ? Who do you
know that does not have this gift?
Pray and ask the Lord to save
them, and thank Him for giving you
the gifts of justification and
sanctification.
